We have been working extremely hard during **Wā Tūhura** in Kōtare P this term on our 'Create It' self directed learning. We have tamariki involved in woodwork projects, stop motion, gardening, baking, sewing, creating outdoor games, Christmas crafts and more! We love learning new skills and being creative during Wā Tūhura.







Food For Thought

We were very fortunate to be involved in the Food For Thought programme where we learnt loads of nutritional information about fresh and processed foods and drinks. We put our learning into action during our visit to Pak'nSave and were VERY surprised at the differences between the food products.











Our main dish for the last two weeks with both Piwakawaka classes, Kea, Ruru, Te Hokioi and both Tui classes, was fried rice. Most of the kids know it as a take-away dish from the local chinese. It is actually very easy to make and traditionally eaten as a breakfast dish in many Asian countries to use up the rice leftover from dinner the night before. Our fried rice was made with lots of different vegetables, like cauliflower, snowpeas, celery, greens and cabbage. A few scrambled eggs made a nice addition too. Last week we had a daikon salad on the side, this week it was lettuce and both times with an asian inspired sesame dressing. For our dessert last week we had beetroot and chocolate cake and this week, a coconut slice with citrus syrup.

During our very wet week last week, Piwakawaka and Kea were indoor gardeners. We learned about the different shapes, sizes and features of seeds and how these features enable them to spread and grow. We finished the lesson by growing sunflower seeds, collected from the garden last summer.

This Wednesday we were lucky with a fine break in the weather so Ruru and Te Hokioi were able to get outside in the garden. After a quick lesson on how to pick fruit correctly to avoid damaging the branches or the fruit, Ruru picked all the remaining mandarins. The trees were covered in drips so we got very soggy as we snuck under the branches to find the last few that were hiding.





We graded the mandarins; dividing them into edible ones and ones to be composted.

Te Hokioi had an exciting new seed to grow today: hue. Hue are not edible but were traditionally grown by Maori and dried to become a vessel for storing or carrying water or food, turned into musical instruments such as flutes, drums and shakers as well as decorative or ceremonial items with designs carved, woven or burned onto the skin. We were gifted nine precious seeds by Garden to Table so Te Hokioi took extra care to look after every seed: clipping the taringa or 'ears' of the seed to allow water to penetrate and sowing them into moist, warm soil. Fingers crossed that at least some germinate! The weather looks a bit 50/50 for Tui on Friday but whether it rains or shines, we will start designing our 'Guinea Pig' māra. This will be a dedicated garden bed to grow greens and other nutritious veggies suitable for feeding to Hawk and Mickey, our school guinea pigs.





Health & Safety

PARKING
